Overview

Purpose of the program and how it relates to college mission, values, vision:

The vision and purpose of the Art Department is to provide students with an exceptional educational experience in the visual arts, promoting intellectual, creative and visual, as well as verbal growth. The faculty in the Art Department serve as mentors to students of the visual arts, preparing them for not only careers in art, but to make choices to include art as an ongoing part of their lives, whether they are art majors, or not. Students can choose from studio and lecture courses covering many aspects of two and three-dimensional art forms and art history, as well. The strong visual arts background students receive at Jefferson College provides them with a strong skill set for transfer to four-year institutions, including a number of prestigious art schools. The portfolio of work that students assemble based on their studies at Jefferson has resulted in many outstanding scholarship awards for further study. Students have gone on to receive advanced degrees from the Kansas City Art Institute, Washington University, and the Columbus College of Art and Design. Additionally, a number of community members continue to take art courses for personal enrichment and frequently return to continue their studies.

As the cultural center of the community, Jefferson College contributes to the mission of the college by hosting visiting artist workshops, exhibits (professional and student) and lectures, providing new experiences to the Jefferson County community.

- 4. A second full-time art instructor's position has been approved and implemented (Nick Nihira).
- 5. A new printmaking press has been installed in the Printmaking Lab.

- 7. Additional sections of online courses have been offered.
- 8. Oil Paint has been introduced as the beginning media in Painting I.

Blake Carroll, Professor of Art, has been employed full-time since 1996. Previously, he taught at Laredo Community College in Laredo, Texas (1988-1996) and at Oklahoma State University in Stillwater, Oklahoma (1986-1988). While earning his MFA in Painting under the tutelage of James Weeks at Boston University, he served as a teaching assistant. Blake's BFA is from the Kansas City Art Institute, where he studied with Wilbur Niewald. Blake is a painter and photographer whose work dances a fine line between figurative and abstract concerns. Blake has been named to *Who's Who in American Teachers* numerous times and received the Governor's Award for Excellence in Teaching. Blake exhibits his paintings and photographs at the college and in juried exhibitions in St. Louis on a regular basis. He frequently judges local art contests, in particular the High School Art Exhibit. Blake is active in the community, coaching little league baseball and AAU basketball and serving as an elder at Grace Presbyterian Church in Crystal City. He has served as the Treasurer for the Cultural Council at Jefferson College for the past several years.

Nicholas Nihira, Instructor of Art, has been employed full-time since 2007. Previously, he taught for two years as an adjunct instructor at various colleges including Jefferson College, St. Louis Community College, and Washington University. While earning his MFA from Washington University, he served as a teaching assistant in the subjects of glassblowing, painting, and design. Nick's BFA is from the Columbus College of Art and Design in Columbus, Ohio, where he studied painting with Gordon Lee. After receiving his MFA, he worked for five years in the commercial art industry as a screen printer and part-time graphic designer. He continues to work with a St. Louis screen printing shop as a freelance graphic designer in addition to creating his own paintings, drawings, and digital works that are predominantly abstract while utilizing representational images as supporting compositional elements. He works with a range of traditional, digital and found media. Nick has shown work regionally, nationally and internationally including, Taiwan and Japan. Nick has also volunteered to judge the Mastodon Art Fair.

Students (The degree to which student needs are met.)

Between 2003 and 2007, the annual credit hours in Art classes has increased from 1302 to 2163 (66.1%).

Student Satisfaction and Feedback:

As a rule, students are very satisfied by the education provided by the Art Department. Each semester, the tenured faculty member conducts student evaluations in one section, and all non-tenured and adjunct faculty members conduct student evaluations in all sections. For review purposes, student evaluations were conducted in all sections during Fall 2007. Student evaluations of both full-time faculty members are consistently high. Reviews of adjunct faculty are closely monitored by full-time faculty, who review adjuncts as well. In the rare cases of underperforming adjuncts, every effort is made to improve their performance through mentoring; if unsuccessful, they are replaced with a more capable instructor. Student enthusiasm is high throughout the art department.

The average attrition rate in Art classes is 7.6%, an indication of persistence and student satisfaction.

Documentation is on file in the Associate Dean's Office ASI, 110.

Student Success:

New processes have been implemented to document student success. In art courses, assessment is an ongoing, everyday part of the learning environment. Assessment logs are being kept to document this ongoing assessment and are brought to faculty's annual performance review. These are on file in the Associate Dean's Office, ASI 110. Assessment measures include the following: faculty critique, student critique, student-to-student group critiques, and written and oral. Faculty provide immediate feedback to students on the quality of their work on a daily basis, improving student understanding of the principles of art, thereby improving their artwork as they seek to compile portfolios. Students at Jefferson College regularly exhibit their work in St. Louis art galleries to a high degree of success. Students are also extremely successful in transferring to four-year institutions, often receiving outstanding scholarships based on the work they created at Jefferson College. Students have transferred to the Kansas City Art Institute, the Columbus College of Art and Design, Washington University as well as numerous other institutions.

<u>Curriculum</u> (The degree to which curriculum is thorough, current, and supported.)

Curriculum (Scope, Currency, Changes):

Official course syllabi have been revised for currency and scope; revisions have been done, and they are on file in ASI 110 and on the web.

Curriculum Issues (Support, Technology, Equipment)

With Jefferson College's commitment to encourage and support the use of technology campus-wide, the Art Department has wholly embraced this philosophy. A number of lecture courses are available online utilizing WebCT, Flash and Real Player; and on-campus lecture and studio courses use WebCT to supplement and facilitate instruction. FA 212, utilized primarily for 2-D and 3-D Design courses is now a SMART classroom, as is the new Mac Lab. Digital Photography and Graphic Design courses (eight in all) are offered in this state of the art lab, now in its third year of use.

One issue for the Art Department is the continued monitoring and maintenance of studio equipment. Due to the heavy use, printers will need to be replaced regularly, software will need to be upgraded and a plan for replacing the computers in the Mac Lab will need to be formulated. Easels and screenprinting screens are also in need of replacing. New-to-us tables have been installed in FA 212, providing for an improved learning environment.

<u>Community</u> (The degree to which the program contributes to the community and responds to community needs)

The Art Department provides community outreach through its exhibitions, lectures and workshops. Each spring semester has seen the college host a high school art exhibition and a college student exhibition. Consideration is being given to the high school show, as it has not drawn the sort of attention we would like to merit the effort needed to mount this exhibit.

Faculty frequently exhibit their work in the gallery at the college, such as it is and in art exhibits beyond the county.

The Art Department faculty regularly participates in local Career Days and make High School visits, as well as judge various exhibitions in the community.

<u>Cost</u>

A summary of the art budget for 2003-2007 is available in the office of the Dean of Arts & Science Education. The cost per FTE for Art classes during this period is \$2,727.67.
