The Jefferson College Faculty Senate recently announced Kim Robertson of Imperial as the 2022 Alumna of the Year during the annual Honors Recognition Ceremony recently held at the College.

Alumnus of the Year Award recipients must have graduated from Jefferson College with a certificate or associate degree, achieved distinction in his/her chosen field of employment, been involved in community service; and not be a current trustee or an employee of Jefferson College.

"I am grateful for the education I received at Jefferson College, which I believe contributed to my later academic and professional success," she said. "I had some excellent professors and instructors and they helped instill in me a desire to continue my education. In addition, my education at Jefferson College helped me develop the writing skills that have served me well since then."

Robertson has served as Leader Publications Editor since 2020 and previously was Managing Editor from 2016-2020, Arnold-Imperial Leader Editor from 2002-2016, and Reporter from 1999-2002. She also served as an adjunct English instructor at Jefferson College (1997-1999), McKendree University (1997-1999), and Belleville Area College (1992-1997).

After graduating from Jefferson College with an associate degree in 1989, she completed a Bachelor of Arts degree from Webster University in 1990, and both a Master of Arts in English (1993) and Master of Education (1996) from the University of Missouri-St. Louis.

She currently serves as a board member and treasurer of the C-6 Educational Foundation and is a former member of the Arnold Rotary Club, Jefferson County Youth Association, and parent volunteer at Simpson Elementary School in the Fox C-6 School District.


Baricevic is a co-recipient of the 2022 Phi Theta Kappa Honor Society Teacher of the Year. She has served as a full-time faculty member at Jefferson College for 19 years. She also has nearly 14 years of professional accounting experience in the financial services industry and is a certified public accountant.

Mary has a Bachelor of Science in Business Administration with a major in Accounting, a Bachelor of Arts with majors in Mathematics and Secondary Math Education, a Master of Professional Accounting, and a Ph.D. in Business Administration with a major in Economics and a minor in Accounting. She earned all of her degrees from Saint Louis University.

"Many of my colleagues are most deserving of this award and I am humbled and honored to have been both nominated and selected," she said. "It is a privilege to be serving students as a faculty member at Jefferson College. For me personally, this teaching position represents a vocation, a dream come true!"

Boning is the recipient of the Emerson Electric Award for Teaching Excellence. His career began as a high school history teacher, and then continued as an administrator. Ken is entering his 16th year at Jefferson College and has been the Teacher Education Program Coordinator for the past 14 years while holding multiple leadership roles in teacher education at the state level. He earned his Ph.D. from Saint Louis University.

He often says that he has the best career one could have because he is able to help individuals become great teachers. His favorite part of teaching is seeing his students grow so much during the program that by the time they graduate, they are ready to succeed in their four-year programs and in their own classrooms.





Steighorst is a co-recipient of the 2022 Phi Theta Kappa Honor Society Teacher of the Year. She graduated with a Bachelor of Science in Mathematics from Missouri Baptist University and a Master of Science in Mathematics from the University of Missouri–St. Louis. She began her career at Jefferson College as adjunct instructor in 2012 and became a full-time faculty member in 2017.

Not only is the College lucky to have Lindsay, but she feels the same. "The faculty and staff at Jefferson College shine with professionalism and support one another like family. I am so blessed to be a part of this family," she stated.

Lindsay is a member of both the national American Mathematical Association of Two-Year Colleges (AMATYC), and its Missouri state affiliate (MOMATYC). Additionally, she serves her community as a member of the Board of Education of Hope Lutheran Church in High Ridge.

Welch is the recipient of the Governor's Award for Excellence in Teaching. She started her higher education experience at a community college prior to earning a Bachelor's Degree in Social Work from the University of Missouri and a Master's Degree in Social Work from St. Louis University.

Welch is in her 11th year at the College as Associate Professor of Sociology and Social Work. Prior to teaching, she spent more than 20 years as a clinical social worker in a variety of settings including child welfare, pregnancy counseling and adoption, school social work, and medical social work.

She is the chair of the Social Work Advisory Committee, a member of the Council on Social Work Education, and Social Work Baccalaureate Program Directors organizations. Her involvement with campus committees has included the Diversity Committee, Civic Engagement, and Campus Safety Initiatives. She was the 2017 recipient of the B. Ray Henry Award, is an active community volunteer, and has presented at numerous professional conferences and seminars.

Jefferson College and CMU Expand Articulation Agreement to Better Serve Students

A longstanding articulation agreement between Central Methodist University and Jefferson College has been expanded to provide additional opportunities for local students to pursue a bachelor's degree in a variety of fields.

The partnership provides an educational pathway for students that leads to further degree attainment and success. By starting their education at a community college, students save money with Jefferson College's reduced tuition costs, while ultimately earning a bachelor's degree as if they attended all four years at CMU.

"This extension agreement is another way Jefferson College is reaching out to four-year colleges and universities in an effort to provide options for our students to earn an associate's and bachelor's degree so that they can succeed in their chosen field," explained Jefferson College President Dr. Dena McCaffrey.

The new agreement allows students to make a seamless transfer from an associate to a baccalaureate degree by clarifying transfer policies and procedures between programs. For Jefferson College students entering focused programs, CMU will credit designated courses as defined in the agreement.

"We're grateful to have such a strong relationship with our friends at Jefferson College," said Dr. Rita Gulstad, CMU provost, who joined Jefferson College President Dr. Dena McCaffrey and Vice President Dr. Chris DeGeare in signing the agreement. "We're both committed to providing a seamless and supportive transfer experience."

The agreement specifically provides guidelines for the transfer of the Associate of Arts, Associate of Arts in Teaching, and Associate of Applied Science degrees. It also adds Jefferson College's new Associate of Science in Biology, which can now transfer easily into Central Methodist's Bachelor of Science in Biology program.

Reading and Math Skills Camps A Free Resource for Prospective Students

The Academic Success Center is offering a three-week Reading Skills Camp and Math Skills Camp for prospective students considering enrolling at Jefferson College. Both camps will be staffed with professionals trained to help students improve their reading and math skills so they are successful in college.

Each skills camp is being provided free of charge as an extension of the College's mission to deliver quality learning opportunities that empower individuals to achieve their goals.

Students who are considering attending Jefferson College are required to demonstrate reading proficiency in order to enroll in college level courses. The Reading Camp is designed to help students achieve that goal. Once completed, students should be prepared to be successful on the college's reading placement exam.

Prospective students who need to enroll in math classes, but have not taken math for a few years, can enroll in the Math Camp to brush-up on their skills as they prepare to earn a successful score on the College's math placement exam.

Both camps will be offered June 13-30 and July 11-29. Participates can attend from 9 a.m.-10:30 a.m. or 10:30 a.m.-noon. The skills camps will be held at the Academic Success Center on the Hillsboro campus in Technology Center Room 111.

Paramedic Program Fall Application Deadline Approaching

The application deadline for the Jefferson College Paramedic program this fall is Wednesday, June 29.

The application process consists of four steps that must be completed in order: (1) submit an application available online at jeffco.edu/emt-paramedic/application (2) complete a written test (all applicants will take a paramedic pre-test and new students must also take a placement exam) (3) participate in an interview (4) selection to the program.

The Paramedic program is taught at Jefferson College Imperial. The location is convenient to surrounding counties and easy to access from I-55. Jefferson College's EMT/Paramedic program provides a state-of-the-art learning environment utilizing mannequins and realistic simulators that enable students to be prepared for real life emergencies. Beyond a variety of individual and large area simulation labs, students are taught using real time video and audio recordings for trauma simulations, medical simulations, pediatric simulations, infant simulations, hospital simulations, and confined area simulations (restroom, living room, etc.).

A career ladder in Emergency Medical Technology has been established, allowing students to stop at any level with job skills or progress to an Associate of Applied Science degree as a paramedic.

Program graduates are eligible to take the National Registry Licensure Test to become a licensed paramedic in the State of Missouri or work in most states.
